

Even those of us doing "well" are, well.. are we really alright? Even with silver linings, new moments of beauty, new time with family, a reorientation of priorities, even with whatever positive aspects there have been, still, I am not sure any of us are as centered, as grounded, as "healthy" as we once were.

Perhaps I should only speak for myself. Separation, loss, forced to learn so many new things... Good flows from much of this, but... I am not ok. Not completely. Not yet.

We enter a new phase, of careful reopening, and the blessing of protection from a miraculous vaccine. And *if* we continue on this path, and *if* enough people get the vaccine, and *if* we significantly shrink the numbers of those who resist it, then we will, for the most part, be able to put this plague behind us.

But what will the world look like, on the other end? What will we return to, and what will be different?

The term "new balance" resonates so deeply because it speaks to reaching a goal, but standing in a way you did not before. It hints at finding the position, the stance, we want to hold... after reacting to the reality around us. It suggests adjustment, accommodation – and success.

Years ago, perhaps the greatest Jewish thinker of all time, Maimonides, known as the Rambam, spoke of the *derekh ha'emtzait*, the middle way, which was also called the *shvil hazahav*, the golden mean. Based on the work of Aristotle, he argued that if we have too much of one trait, we should seek to "leaven" it with the opposite. If are too modest (and yes, I have met such people occasionally), we should learn to be more assertive. If we are too reckless, we should school ourselves in caution. A healthy place, he wrote, for body and soul, was a stance which is honest about who we are, open-eyed about the world around us, and which mediates a balance between emotion and events, our inner world and external experience.

It is a time of challenge and change. We have stumbled, and need to "find our footing" on new and shaky ground. We are, none of us, who we were, and where we were. May we help each other, and help ourselves, towards a new day, a new way... and a new balance, in all of our lives.



Tu B'Av (The 15th of Av) The Jewish Holiday of Love!

As less-well-known Jewish holidays go, there's almost nothing better than Tu B'Av, the fifteenth of the Hebrew month of Av!

Many more people know about Tisha B'Av, the Ninth of Av, which falls this year on Saturday, July 17-Sunday, July 18, from sunset to sunset. That is, of course, the sad day, on which, tradition says, the First Temple was destroyed by the Babylonians in 586 BCE, and (approximately) the Second Temple was destroyed by the Romans in 70 CE. That is a fast day, a day of mourning and memory.

What is Tu B'Av?

The first time we hear of Tu B'Av is in the early post-Biblical period. It was, we read, a day of matchmaking, a time for unmarried women to find partners. Its origin is unknown; there is some speculation that it marked the end of an internal tribal conflict, allowing all tribes to... socialize... with one another again.

Tu B'Av has been revived in Israel today, in secular observance as a kind of Jewish Valentine's Day. It is observed with romantic dates, concerts and festivals, modern matchmaking, with an emphasis on entertainment and sales on beauty products.

Tu B'Av Saturday, July 24, 2021 "Linking the night of the full moon with romance, love and fertility is not uncommon in ancient cultures."

People of the Jewish and Muslim faiths, as well as Christians with roots in the Middle East, have been living and working harmoniously in the Virgin Islands for many decades now.

There have been Jews in the Virgin Islands since the 17th century, living in religious freedom since 1685, founding the first synagogue on these shores in 1796. In that entire time, we have cherished our ties both with all other groups and populations on these islands, as well as with Jews all over the world – including in Israel.

On an individual level, relationships between Jewish and Muslim islanders have been good, and even close. Friendships developed, and partnerships flourished.

Solid foundations for this friendship are already in place. As a Jewish community we were very grateful when the Imam attended services at the St. Thomas synagogue to show support following the massacre at Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh a few years ago. And we were immediately present at the mosque in solidarity after a so-called "ISIS flag" was put up outside the Cyril E. King airport a year after that.

But there remains much work to be done and many bridges to build between our communities. And, as we see now: events from far away can pose a challenge even on a local level.

Anyone with a heart hopes for an end to suffering, cruelty and loss of life on every side of even the most complicated conflict. The tragedy of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict is immense, and intense.

Still, a rally held on May 26, 2021 in Christiansted, was so problematicthat many in the Jewish community believe we cannot remain silent.

The pain of Palestinians is real. We understand and relate to their suffering, anger and frustration. And we certainly support the right to give voice to those feelings. But what happened at the St. Croix rally went beyond that.

- 1. The rally moved from protest to hate.
- 2. The article was biased, one-sided, and contained blatant factual errors.
- 3. An **opportunity to share anguish was lost** in a moral haze, an expression of solidarity which, possibly well-intentioned on the part of some participants, nevertheless gave support to ignorance, and made a volatile situation worse.

And the pain and fear of Israelis is real as well.

Before we share what was so wrong about this protest, we want to be clear about three things. Speaking for ourselves now and not on behalf of our communities: We do believe that some of Israel's recent actions were provocative. Also, we still hold out hope for a two-state solution: independent, democratic states of Israel and Palestine living side by side in security and peace. Finally, as we learned in kindergarten, we can say that an action is bad without saying a person is bad. The same thing is true of communities, and of countries. We believe that one can be critical of policies, without saying that the entire polity, an entire country, should be erased, or cease to exist.

So here is what was wrong with the rally and its coverage:

This was 100% one-sided coverage of an extremely complicated conflict. No attempt at all was made to convey any other perspective. (And this is not a question, such as whether the earth is flat, which deserves only one side presented.)

We understand calls for humanity. But in this case, to see one side as only victims and the other as only aggressors, and to ignore textbook definitions of terrorism by your own people -- that is not supportive of humanity. That is simply inhumane

There were **serious factual errors** in statements made at the rally. Israel's response to Hamas rockets was tragic, traumatic and terrible; one could legitimately raise questions about that response on many levels. What it was not, however, was "random." And what it was, significantly, was a response, a reaction to what was, in fact, random – and clearly an act of terrorism — the firing of over 4500 rockets into Israeli cities, towns and villages. The fact that these are crude weapons which cannot be precisely targeted is exactly the point of what makes this an act of terror and a crime against humanity. (Did the people marching in Christiansted even know that some of the Israelis killed by Hamas rockets were, in fact, Palestinian Arab citizens of Israel – including a child?) It is certainly one perspective to refer to those in Gaza as only "victims." But whatever one's overall orientation, to not even mention the rockets fired into Israel by Hamas would be obscene.

Here is a fact, which we believe anyone who is honest will admit: If there were no rockets coming from Gaza, there would be no Israeli airstrikes in Gaza. If, on the other hand, there were no Israeli defense against terrorism, there would be no Israel.

Even those who organized the march on Wednesday know this! There were shirts and signs showing **all of Israel**, as well as the West Bank and Gaza, with the word "Palestine" over all of it. Those bearing such signs are quite clear about their goal and hoped-for outcome here, which they would happily impose if there were no Israeli defense against the use of force. They know it, even if many well-meaning or kind-hearted folks they got to join them do not.

The Palestinians have repeatedly suffered many tragedies, and many people of all faiths -- including Jews -- and all nationalities -- including Israelis -- are open to finding a better path forward, involving safety, security and dignity for all sides. While we acknowledge their suffering, to say that the Palestinians are "the last people on the face of the earth that are still under colonial occupation" is inaccurate, at best. Many Tibetans would disagree, and Kurds, and Chechens, and many others; it is, sadly, a very long list!

Most significantly, there are hurtful and frightening ways in which this protest moved from questioning Israel's policies to being against Jews and Judaism. The clearest example here is the chant "Palestine will be free, from the river to the sea." Make no mistake about it. Look at a map if you need to, to see what they mean. This is a direct call for the destruction of the state of Israel.

History, including recent events in the 20th century, with the persistent denial of refuge to Jews – including here in the Virgin Islands – firmly testifies to the need for one place in the world which can serve as beacon and safe-haven for our people.

Calling for a change to Israeli policy, even in strong terms which we might disagree with, is legitimate protest. Chanting for the eradication of the entire country, however, is hate speech. It is dangerous, inherently violent, and deeply anti-Jewish.

We can, we should, and we must do better. All of us. We call on the members of the Jewish and Muslim communities of the Virgin Islands, and, indeed, all those in this territory who are people of good will who care about events in other places as well as here, to find ways to peacefully come together. We invite our Muslim and Palestinian neighbors to join us in mutual acknowledgment of shared values and commitment to pursue peace and equal opportunities for all people. Let us, together, denounce hatred, prejudice and violence wherever it appears. Let us learn to appreciate how diversity enriches our lives, granting opportunities to all to relish our colorful and common humanity.

Each of our communities are suffering here because of what is happening there. But all of us can find our own oases – without denying pain, but by somehow, carefully, delicately... coming closer together. And as we do find ways to work together, all people, of all faiths, will be able to see the blessings, and the beauty to be found in both of our communities, and both of our traditions.
