SELICHOT ......Saturday, August 28, 8:00 PM

The climax of the Hebrew month of Elul comes during the service of Selichot, an exercise in spiritual preparation for the Days of Awe. Traditionally held at midnight on the Saturday night/Sunday before Rosh Hashanah, Jews around the world gather together for what is, truly, the first of the High Holy Day services, a brief but intense experience during which the music and liturgy of the season are used for the first time. The service is filled with drama and awe, as in the dark of the night we begin to bare our souls, and plead for forgiveness.

At the Hebrew Congregation of St. Thomas, we begin our observance of Selichot this year with the Israeli film *Footnote*. Nominated for Best Foreign Language film in 2012, this is not an "action" film in the classic sense -- it is about integrity, loyalty, academic and family rivalries, the balance between self-knowledge and public perception, and, perhaps, the meaning of love and truth.



Following the film, we enter the Sanctuary at 10:00 PM to the background melodies of the season, where our youth will lead us in Havdalah (the ceremony marking the end of Shabbat) and then, in candlelight and to the call of the Shofar, the actual service of Selichot begins.



We gather in the Sanctuary for a revised Yom Kippur Afternoon Service. This unique service includes reading the ethical heart of the Holiness Code from the Torah, telling the tale of Jonah as the Haftarah the Grand Aleinu, a poetic reconstruction of the history of our people, aspects of the traditional Avodah service (the moment when the High Priest of old sought atonement for the entire people), and the *Eleh Ezkerah* martryology. In our new machzor (High Holy Day prayerbook), this service is also the most "different" in tone and content from what we have seen in prayerbooks in the past.

The *Yizkor* Memorial Service (at which we distribute our annual *Book of Remembrance*) begins immediately upon the completion of the Afternoon service, with no defined break. We estimate that Yizkor might begin at approximately 5:30 PM.

The **Ne'ilah Concluding Service** begins immediately upon the completion of the *Yizkor* prayers.

Please remain in the Sanctuary through the conclusion of Ne'ilah.

The final sounding of the shofar will take place sometime before 7 PM. Anyone wishing to blow the shofar should bring one to the sanctuary for the final Tekiah Gedolah. All children will be called forward to participate in a brief ceremony of Havdalah.

## Who Are We? Right and Wrong and Me and You

## Message from Rabbi Michael L. Feshbach



Well, I was wondering what it was (other than an election and insurrection) which could come along and knock the pandemic from the top of the news, even if temporarily. Now I know.

Perhaps my most prophetic sentence, ever, was in April of 2001. It was then, just after the destruction of the 1500-year old Buddhist statues in Bamyan, Afghanistan that I wrote "this Yom Kippur, think about the Taliban." Of course, even then I could not imagine what was yet to unfold, in September of that year. But one thing was clear: extremism was on the rise, and violence was not far behind.

Twenty years have passed since that time – twenty years of having to shield young children from the evening news, twenty years of war and conflict and turmoil. And now, here we are, eyes on Afghanistan again, talking about the Taliban again, haunted, some of us, by images of Saigon as well.

The high holy day prayerbook is called, in Jewish tradition, a "machzor." It is not a siddur – the usual word for a prayerbook, which is related to "seder," meaning "order." Rather, "machzor" comes from "Ch.Z.R," which means "to return." It carries the sense of coming back, of circles and cycles and seasons, of standing, once again, where we were before.

The "return" I wanted to focus on this year, of course, was a physical one. It was to be about space, and place.

We are watching the Delta variant closely, and we will be able to pivot and make changes if we must – but as of this writing and from the rest of this issue of our High Holy Day bulletin you can see that we are still planning for a physical return (for those who are vaccinated, if eligible; children under 12 are still and always welcome).

But with images of a swift and stunning Taliban takeover of Afghanistan, with moral obligations to those who have helped us pulling at our hearts, for me the questions of the season include: here we are again. Who are we, and what is next? What do we owe ourselves, and what do we owe to others.

In 2001 I had just arrived at my congregation in Maryland. I remember saying something about Taliban practices to my Confirmation students that year, and hearing many of them respond that I should not criticize them, because it's just their culture. And any belief and opinion and practice was equally valid.



Really? Intolerance to the point of blowing up centuries-old statues, destroying a cultural heritage? Or, more to the point, not letting girls learn to read? Are we really so afraid of being called out for or imperialism or accused of being judgmental that we cannot say that we think there is such a thing as right and wrong in the world?

And yes, this does "circle back" to COVID, in its own way. I was on the ferry a few months ago, speaking with a group of folks I knew from elsewhere on the island. One woman said she was not vaccinated, because she just did not want to do it. She was just opposed to the idea. Her friend put her arm around her and said "and that's perfectly okay."

So let's be clear. None of us are God, and nothing is guaranteed, and there are times in history when a strong consensus has turned out to be incorrect.

But in my world, and with all the evidence I see, what I wanted to say is "no, it's not. perfectly okay." You are a danger... to yourself and to others. And in terms of our tradition I would say that: getting vaccinated, standing up for equality, fighting against intolerance... these are not "options." These are not "personal choices." They are, each of them, *mitzvot*. They are commandments. To act, for life and truth and right... these are obligations.

So here we are again. What calls us, and what draws us? To what are we committed, and to what are we bound? How are we tied to one another? And, at the end of the day, and the beginning of the year – who are we, and what are we called upon to do?

May it be a better year, a healthier one, a good one... for you, for your family and friends, and for the world.





Captain William "Bill" Pinkney, a Chicago native living in Fajardo, Puerto Rico will be inducted into the National Sailing Hall of Fame in Newport, Rhode Island on October 16, 2021.



The announcement was made today by the President of the National Sailing Hall of Fame Museum that in addition to the induction Pinkney will receive the Lifetime Achievement Award which as only been award a few times. Captain Bill will join such notables as America's Cup winners as Ted Turner and Dennis Conners along with Joshua Slocum the first man to sail around the world solo. In addition to his many accomplishments are a Peabody Award winning documentary about his sail and he has written a children's book used nationwide as a Basel reader for first graders, as well as an autobiography that Maya Angelou called: "....a travel book of the first order." As expedition leader of the Middle Passage Institute's "Voyages Home" project he took teachers to Brazil and West Africa to create a five part video series distributed by Great Plains National, a division of the University of Nebraska. As the first Master of the Freedom Schooner AMISTAD, he has traveled the East and Gulf coasts, England, Portugal, Sierra Leone, Senegal and Cuba telling the story of the revolt of African captives that sparked the first Human Rights case in the U.S Supreme Court.

This induction will bring diversity to the upper level of organized sailing and a broader view of African-Americans at sea both recreational and professional over the course of the history of America as a maritime nation.
